

### **Romans Bible Study**

On the penultimate day of February 2024 we will, as a circuit, be embarking on another Bible Study. We enjoyed the Bible Course in 2022 and we 'survived' our study of the Book of Revelation last year and now it's the turn of book of Romans.

Dr Andrew Ollerton, who wrote and presented the Bible Course has written and presented this new Bible Study. The format will be similar to before. In each session there are:

- Two short videos to watch
- Questions to discuss and answer
- A time for reflection

Between the sessions there are Bible verses to read to help us understand where the next session is going.

To paraphrase Match of the Day, this time it's a game of two halves. The whole study comprises ten sessions in all and we are going to do the first five sessions before Easter and the second five sessions from mid-September onwards.


### Sessions at Witham, Maldon and Halstead

### **Circuit Refugee Crisis Fund**

This fund was launched in 2021 and since then we have helped seven Ukrainian families find a home in the Chelmsford and surrounding areas when they were at risk of becoming homeless after sponsorship arrangements broke down or ended. The families have suffered trauma of war destroying their homes and lives and managed to escape to the UK for the duration of the war in their country.

We have been working closely with Chelmsford City Council to fund new homes for these families. We have just completed the seventh grant to pay a rental deposit family whose landlord decided to sell their home after 6 months of moving them in! No doubt the Landlord is seeing rents rise rapidly and will re-let at a higher rental.

### This is what Natalia, the latest family to be helped, says:

Thankyou very much for helping our family. I am very grateful for your help in renting an apartment. You saved us from homelessness and I hope that one year we will have a home [in Ukraine]. I am grateful that you are involved in other people's lives and help those in need,

In addition to rental deposit grants we have helped fund language classes at Broomfield Methodist for 14 ladies over the summer. Natalia has benefited and from speaking little English has progressed to be able to write this letter. She also works hard as does her mother and daughter to be able to pay the rent on the apartment.

We still have £7658 and the Just Giving page set up by the Circuit is still open to receive donations. https://www.justgiving.com/campaign/chelmsfordcircuitrefugeecrisisfund

The data about donations on this Just giving page is a bit misleading as there were problems setting up the page correctly meaning earlier data was lost..

We know that at least 6 Ukrainian families are urgently seeking new homes in the area where their children are going to school, they have found work and friendships, making a life for themselves out of the harm from Russian missiles.

Rents continue to rise in Essex making the chances of independent renting without help from funding such as we have been able to provide is almost impossible..

The average rent for a two bed apartment in Chelmsford is now between £1200-£1500 per month. A rental deposit is required of between £1500 - £1875

We are open to receive applications for help from the many Afghan families still in hotel accommodation, but so far have not received any.

#### **EDI and Unconscious Bias training**

The session is being led by the District lead on this subject and will be interactive and not "heavy". At the end you will get a certificate!

### Hopes and Dreams of Methodist Women in Britain

In our personal lives, we all have hopes and dreams and strive towards their fulfilment. As Methodist Women in Britain and the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting

Church Women, we also have hopes and dreams. Our aim is 'To know Christ and to make him known'. What we find impossible to achieve individually, together, we can begin to make a difference. We dream of a fairer world: a world of gender equality, where poverty and slavery are eradicated, a world where everyone receives a welcome

There are four aspects of our work: Creative Spirituality, World Church Focus, Social Action and Resourcing and Enabling. We see MWIB as a charity rooted in prayer. through our Prayer Diary, Weekly Prayers and Reflections on our Website, Easter Offering Service and by creating new resources as the needs arise to support our work. We offer these and other worship materials to support the growth of the Methodist way of life.

Issues of social action have always been at the core of MWIB. Core issues include gender violence, gender empowerment and gender equality. MWIB hopes and dreams in these areas would be in its purest form, that we would be virtually redundant, not needing to raise awareness or campaign for women. Although those hopes and dreams may yet be far off MWIB is committed to continue to strive to achieve them.

For example, we have raised awareness of domestic violence by our "Thursdays in Black" initiative and continue to call out both overt and covert examples of bias and misogyny in the way such situations as bullying and safeguarding are handled.

Progress towards creating a world where women feel confident and safe has been slow and among our hopes and dreams would be to see an environment where women would be protected and empowered through legislation and cultural enlightenment. Evidence would seem to indicate that the level of domestic violence, harassment, stalking, and rape remains unacceptably high.

Linked to that is the trafficking of vulnerable girls and women that locks women into a life of fear and degradation. MWIB has worked to raise awareness of how this trade operates and exploits vulnerable women. By investing in and empowering women we hope that those who are vulnerable to exploitation will have choices and opportunities for their future. Much of the cost of this exploitation remains hidden and among our hopes and dreams is a desire to shine a light on this exploitation and make it difficult for these activities to continue,

MWIB continues to raise awareness of cultural issues that lead to violence against women, The complexities around FMG and child brides for example means that that solutions are not found easily but our hope is that through education and empowerment women can be freed from the continued mutilation and pain that is inflicted for cultural and traditional purposes and endangering women's health. Alongside this, cultural issues

of dowry and child brides continue to limit opportunities. Our hope is for women's bodies to be appreciated for what they are and not mutilated to satisfy cultural or patriarchal desires.

Empowering women to develop skills for independence and self-promotion has been another area of action for MWIB, in particular, in relation to independence, business and entrepreneurship. Our hopes and dreams of true equality for women worldwide remain a driving force.

### Resourcing and Enabling

MWIB has a commitment to finding ways to raise awareness and empower churches to meet the challenges that come from the social issues of the world, through partnerships and gifts. Included in that is creating opportunities for women to learn and grow through district days, retreats and pilgrimage. Our commitment remains, as stated in our strapline, "for women, for justice, for Christ" for all our activities.

We are aware that there is a need to raise awareness and explore issues of women's health and wellbeing and to that end we have begun a series of webinars to meet that need. One of our hopes and dreams could be seen as a desire for greater awareness of issues such as the menopause and for further research and development into women's health and health promotion. Women's issues matter and impact on the wider society

Another of our hopes and dreams is to see that gender empowerment will ensure that women everywhere can reach their full potential and not be held back by a lack of access to education or work opportunities. Although some progress has been made, there are still too many women banging their head on the glass ceiling. Developing ways to empower women, creating a climate where they can achieve their goals, is a key principle and aspiration of MWIB.

Our hopes and dreams for the development of the work of MWIB come together to form a vision for a world where gender based issues are no longer an issue. We are a small charity, but we have a big vision and we are growing again post covid. Forming partnerships with other agencies and charities such as All We Can, Action for Children, methodist Homes for the Aged etc. enables us to be more effective. We feel we have a lot to offer to the Methodist Church not only in our gift of the Easter Offering but in our involvement in all aspects of the life of the church at all levels.

### **UNCONSCIOUS BIAS TRAINING**


(this is part of the EDI Module—have you completed this as well?)

# Halstead Methodist Church organ and a Young Man!

2024 is going to see the start of a special year for Halstead. We will be celebrating 150 years since the laying of the foundation stone in 1874. In this issue I am covering predominantly the history of our Historical Listed Bevington Pipe Organ which was previously installed in what was the Halstead Adams Brewery Chapel behind Trinity House, Trinity Street.

Thomas Francis Adams, who worked for the City of London Brewery for 26 years bought the Halstead Brewery in September 1876. He and his wife, Mary, moved to Halstead with their two sons,

Edgar, a registered lay preacher, and Percy, an accomplished organist.

Thomas died in 1878 and in 1883 his widow and his sons built a chapel (the little church) in his memory, in the grounds of the brewery. The building was used as a reading room and for Sunday afternoon services for the brewery workmen and their families, these services having previously been conducted in the corner of the brewery granary.

In July1883 Percy's organ was installed and in subsequent editions of the Halstead Gazette frequently referred to "organ solos by Mr Percy Adams". The edition of 2<sup>nd</sup> January 1890 records:- "This room (the reading room chapel) was very prettily decorated for the Christmas Festival. Above the organ, in white letters on a crimson ground, was the text "Unto you is born this day a Saviour" and on the organ was a silver star..."

In 1939 the brewery was sold to Isherwood, Foster and Stacey, a subsidiary of Fremlins, but the family retained ownership of the Chapel. For the next 20 years the chapel, and consequently the organ, remained unused. In 1960, David Shearmur, a member of the Halstead Methodist Church, and himself an organist, arranged to buy the organ for £100. It was subsequently moved to the Methodist Church in New Street, its removal and renovation, including the fitting of an electric blower, cost a further £350. It is believed that Bishop & Son of Beethoven Street, London carried out the removal. Certainly they tuned the organ in the following year and have maintained it up to the present time.

A dedication service took place on the 27<sup>th</sup> October 1961, a recital being given by Mr Hedley Norfolk, then organist and choirmaster of the Braintree Methodist Church. On the 5<sup>th</sup> April 1975 the Centenary of the Church was marked, among other events, by an Organ Recital by Mr Jack Smith A.R.C.O. of Steeton, Yorkshire.

Graffiti on the end of the organ, adjacent to the "blowers" position, records several names and dates. Some of these were probably young teenagers, the older brewery workers being engaged in the 1914/18 war.

Moving on into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century we were honoured to have an organist from Westminster Abbey playing the organ for his friend's wedding in our church in 2021 and it was such an honour to have someone of his calibre playing the organ to its greatest potential and had it not been for the Covid restrictions being slowly lifted back then would have been heard by a greater number of people who would have heard this delightful performance rather than the limited number of just 30 at the time.

To this day the organ has been regularly used by our organist Keith and also young Elliott who has become very confident playing our organ some weeks and certainly played for the whole service on Christmas Eve. Elliott has become impressively confident playing on one occasion in the summer at our special service organised by our Ghanaian family when we had around 55 at the service.

This leads me on to Elliott's appearance at the Remembrance Day Parade in Chelmsford in November. Elliot lead the parade on behalf of the Combined Cadet Force, CCF, from the King Edward VI Grammar School in Chelmsford where he is in his last year. To his Mum's total surprise on the day he was actually leading the band.

Elliott has been a part of our church all of his life and we are also very proud just as his family are of him.

Well done, Elliott, keep up the good work!
