Work of God at Broomfield Eco Church

'The Tools With A Mission' scheme was very successful, and we are still collecting and storing equipment and bibles for this charity as part of our Eco mission. We have also been recycling unwanted electrical equipment and plastic plant pots. We are still collecting these items and are happy for any of the churches in the circuit to bring such materials to Broomfield, or indeed to contact us for details of TWAM, "Tools with a Mission," to support in your own churches.

Messy Church crafts are now sourced using, as far as possible recycled /ecofriendly materials and we have moved to using eco-friendly cleaning materials.

 At Christmas we entered the village Xmas Tree event with our Eco tree made from an old pallet and decorated with craft work reflecting the things we have been doing as part of our Eco mission. Everyone was impressed and we came first thanks to the imagination of Hilary and her helpers. Later in the year we attended an Eco event hosted by the village hall to spread the word of how we are living out being an Eco Church. We are very encouraged by the opportunities this form of outreach affords.



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Church Charity for 2022-3

Our Toilet Twinning Charity has proved very successful and we were able to twin all six of our church toilets by Christmas, and a number of our church congregation also twinned their own toilets as well as giving a twinned toilet as a gift to friends and family at Christmas.



Hilary, as our eco warrior, then encouraged us to look outside our church with the aim of making Broomfield a toilet twinned village by the end of August 2023. I am delighted to say we have achieved this with the church gifting toilets to the local café, the pub and a whole toilet block to the primary school. Other organisations in the village have raised money to twin their own toilets in the village hall and the British Legion and our friends at St Mary's have also twinned their toilets. The events we have been invited to attend in the village have enabled us not only to raise money for this venture but to raise awareness as well.

We also raised money for Tear Fund by participating in the annual Quiz Night in November. A good time was had by all who attended and we intend to support it again this year so do look out for the details. We would love to welcome a team from all the circuit churches and this year the quiz will be in **October.**

Messy Church

We have 10 or more families who are regulars at the Monday afternoon sessions where adults and children alike enjoy listening to bibles stories, singing songs and making things to remind them of the theme of the day.



In addition, as a form of outreach, we supported a Halloween Event at the village hall by providing craft activities which focused on Light as an antidote to the usual Halloween themes. Later in May 23 we manned a tent at the village Coronation Celebration and here we were able to promote the values of Messy church and continued to raise awareness of the need for Toilet Twinning.

CHRIST CHURCH BRAINTREE

Christ Church, Braintree.

Last Christmas, people from our church decided to go **Carol Singing** around our local streets; and instead of asking for donations we knocked on doors and gave a gift to the residents. This seemed to be well received and we saw a few new faces at our Christmas Services.

During the year we decided to relaunch our Home Groups as Life Groups with a churchwide campaign based on the Bible Society **Bible Course**. This saw two new Life Groups added to our others and an increased number of people involved. We intend 2024 to be a year of focusing on Prayer, using Pete Greig's course material to explore this subject throughout the church family – including our families and young people.

In February we launched a new mission around Valentine's Day called **'URLoved'**. We had a meal together and then the women had a 'Pamper Session' whilst the men shared together after a talk from our friend Simon Pinchbeck. Simon spoke about his time in the Metropolitan Police Force, followed by being drawn into a life of crime and eventually becoming a Christian.

We intend to hold our second 'URLoved' mission in February 2024 when we will be welcoming a member of 'Tough Talk' to share their take on living as a follower of Jesus in society today.

For those struggling with their mental health we ran **Kintsugi Hope** earlier in the year. The sessions covered a wide range of topics which so many people have struggled with especially after the Pandemic years.

We ran a new **Membership Pathway** over four evenings and were delighted to welcome new people into the Christ Church family. This was then followed up by a **Discipleship Pathway** which ran over five evenings, which encouraged people to go deeper in their faith journey. We are currently developing our **Discovering Your Spiritual Gifts Pathway** for the Autumn which will look at helping people learn how to use their gifts and abilities in the life of the church. For parents and grandparents, we ran **'Left to their own Devices'** (Care for the Family) session. This looked at ways of keeping children safe when they are online. We had a small group but some helpful learning and discussion.

We were delighted to receive some funding from The United Reformed Church to employ a part-time **Family-link worker** for three years. We recognize that there are many families using the Church building during the week who do not connect with us as a church family. We appointed a former teacher, Linda Hendry, from the congregation who has been working on this project since Easter. She has been working with these families and planning lots of different ways to form connections. We have held a Family Summer Holiday Club; several family fun sessions; and more exciting plans are being developed.

We have also restarted **Parade Services** for our Uniformed Groups which we know will take time to increase numbers but look forward to having the groups join us on these occasions.

Our teenagers have once again been to the **'Dreaming the Impossible'** Summer camp in Staffordshire and have returned with their faith fired-up. We are so grateful to the leaders who organize this trip every year and our congregation who support them throughout the year in their fundraising for the trip.

Finally, we are training a team to run **The Bereavement Journey**, a course for anyone who has lost someone either recently or a while ago. These sessions will encourage people to talk about their experience and find support and assistance in working on the grief they are experiencing.

GT NOTLEY

We are celebrating our 25th Anniversary this year and have 54 members. We celebrated with a Celebration Weekend in June, with a Friday evening concert, a Saturday Family Fun Day and a Celebration Sunday Service.

We have several activities taking place regularly, including:-

Two weekly coffee mornings, which are supported by a walking group, together with the Ministers after prayers on Tuesdays and Fridays.

Crafty Cuppa is a fun, craft group meeting on Thursday mornings for coffee, whilst making craft items.

Snackanory meets once a week, during the term-time, for pre-school children and their carers. This is a very successful group with an average of 18-20 children attending each week.

Foodbank Distribution Centre. We are one of the distribution centres for the Braintree Area Foodbank and give food every Tuesday morning to those in need.

Junior Church runs twice a month during the term and we have a Young People and Families Worker who keeps these sessions fun and engaging for the children who attend.

Ladies Oasis is held once a month for ladies to meet, relax and chat.

Café & Chat meets once a month for coffee/tea, home-made cake and a chat, including a general knowledge quiz and a wordsearch, which are fun to do. In September/October we will start to produce Link to Hope Christmas shoeboxes, to be sent abroad to those in need.

Purely Prayer is held once a month on a Friday evening, to increase the prayer life of the congregation.

A new Bible Study group has recently begun twice a month on a Tuesday evening and is well-attended.

Youth Drop-In for Year 7 and above meet once a month during the termtime on a Friday evening. They have an hour of free play, then come together for a group activity. Numbers are increasing which is good to see.

A new monthly Solo Parenting group has also begun for solo parents, to give them support, swap tips and share problems.

Community Events have included a Pumpkin Trail and All Hallows Event, which was a huge success. At Easter, around 40 children took part in an Easter Trail and there was also a Story Trail following in the steps of the two men on the Emmaus Road with Jesus. At the Easter Messy Church, 35 children attended. A Messy Church afternoon was also held in August.

A new Music Group has recently been formed to lead our singing at our services and we are grateful to our pianist who has recently joined our congregation.

Finally, in September we will have a **Prayer Weekend** including a Gift Day for general funds. We are partially funding a Benefice Administrator to work for us and our sister churches, All Saints, Rayne and St. Peter's & St. Paul's, Black Notley. We will also need a part-time caretaker in the future.

As our church continues to grow, we thank God for the dedication and service of our Congregation.

By teaching the word of God through Bible study, prayer and fellowship.



We held our annual gift service in early December with a focus on the Foodbank, led by Sue Johnson. A substantial quantity of food was collected and delivered to the Chelmsford Branch of the Trussell Trust Foodbank.

Carols featured again at our combined Carol Service with the Zimbabwean church led by Mark. We sang in different languages but the tunes remained the same. This was followed by a bring and share lunch, which everyone seemed to enjoy.

During the lead up to Christmas, Glenda Griffin led us in a joint Moulsham and St Luke's Advent Study, which was well attended. Hopefully we can persuade Glenda to do the same in December 2023.

Another feature of this period was a crafting afternoon aimed at decorating the scrabble board in the hallway with characters and scenes from the nativity. Much chat, drawing, colouring, painting and sticking was shared by a good number including some from outside of church. Meanwhile the Art and Craft Group was pursuing its own decoration with pictures, again depicting the Nativity, which it displayed for all to see on the Main Hall walls.

The culmination of Christmas reflections and celebrations was a light hearted Christmas Morning Family Service led by Jim Lowe, who had us all in stitches with his Black Country humour. Again we welcomed some new faces.

The New Year saw us working together again with St Luke's with another combined service hosted by them in February.

Throughout November, December and January the church hosted a "Warm Thursday" from Coffee Club through to Art Group in the afternoon with a number of the congregation volunteering as greeters and hosts. This was an offering to our community during a period of extreme energy cost increases. It was disappointing not to receive any new guests but this, it appeared, was in line with a number of other similar ventures, which, despite the publicity, had attracted only a few, if any, through their doors.

March was church anniversary month. This year our birthday celebrations were a lunch entitled "bangers and mash bash". The main course was provided by the church and the desserts were brought along on the day. Needless to say there was plenty to go round. Worship on Sunday was a combined Parade/Anniversary Service led by Deacon Ramona.

Many of our fellowship worked really hard to make our services leading up to and including Easter such a blessing to all who attended. Many talents all came together for the work of the Kingdom. I doubt we shall ever forget the Palm Sunday parade from the shops with our brothers and sisters from the Zimbabwean church fellowship singing and whooping their way to the building for worship led by Deacon Ramona.

A number of us joined the Good Friday procession of witness either along the way or in the City Centre and again after worship we were treated to witness from the guys of Tough Talk. Ramona led a time of reflection in the afternoon and on Easter Sunday we joined together in a service of Holy Communion to celebrate this very special day.

Early summer saw much time devoted to the issue of finances within the church and the ability to pay the assessment in full for 2023 – 2024, having been forced to reduce our contribution to Circuit quite substantially for the current period. A group representing the Church Council has been attending the Four Churches in Chelmsford discussions on where we see Methodism in Chelmsford in the future, our financial deliberations being included as one input to the way ahead for us all. Much has yet to be done and we place our trust in the Lord to guide us and show us how we may use our resources wisely in the future.

Whilst many groups close for the summer holiday period, our volunteer team running the weekly Coffee Club decided to keep running, a decision welcomed by those who attend. We are ever grateful to the dedication of this and the Friendship Club teams for the hard work put into making both a success.

As the church year drew to a close we were again hosted for a worship service by St Luke's and we look forward to working ever closer with our friends "over the road" in 2023/2024.

It seems wholly appropriate that our last service of the church year will be a Songs of Praise, which also falls on the fourth Sunday this year. Consequently we are hosting all of the Chelmsford City Churches for what we anticipate to be a good time of worship and hopefully some exuberant as well as reflective singing.

We had a joint service of Remembrance in November with our Anglican friends led by a Methodist local Preacher.

We had a variety of Christmas services and Advent Courses during the Christmas season.

We had a tree of Joy in Church during the Festive season to collect toys and Gifts for children who would not usually receive a gift at Christmas. It was very well supported and people gave generously.

We had an Outdoor Town Carol Service in the Town Square. All denominations from the town took part. It was unfortunate that it was a particularly cold Winters night!

There was a United Covenant Service with Maldon, Witham, Hatfield Peverel and ourselves on January 15th followed by a shared lunch.

A vigil for Ukraine *organ*ised by the Christian Council took place in the town on 25th February. Each Church had a specific half hour slot. It was a cold and wet day but nothing compared to the suffering of the people in Ukraine as we remembered them in prayer on their first anniversary of the Invasion from Russia.

World Day of Prayer organised by the Methodists in South Woodham Ferrers took place on March 3rd. The service was well attended and many people commented on the lovely atmosphere in Church as we joined in the celebrations with the Women of Taiwan. We all enjoyed fellowship and delicious refreshments after the service! A special service to commission Val Carter as Anna Chaplain for South Woodham Ferrers took place on March 5th. It was a lovely service with many people attending to support Val.

We enjoyed an ecumenical Lent Course on the prayers of Jesus led by our Anglican Minister, Rev Carol Ball. Carol retired after Easter and we miss her very much and all the support she gave to the Methodist Church. We had a joint service followed by shared lunch on her last Sunday (April 23rd)

The Anglican Church is currently without a minister and we are working together to share some services. They are invited to our Monthly Communion services on the first Sunday of the Month.

Our witness on Good Friday was an open air worship and drama at the Bandstand in our town square. We felt this was an effective way to witness our Faith in the town.

In May The Methodist Church had an hourly slot at a stall run by the combined churches in South Woodham Ferrers at an event celebrating the King's Coronation. It was good to see the way the community participated in the crafts and stories that we presented and they had lots of fun doing the arts and crafts that all had biblical themes.

In June we had an extra Church Council meeting to explore the Church's vision, mission and the way forward. Our Anglican friends were invited.

We have registered as an Eco Church and are working towards obtaining an Eco Church award.
